

Rev. Cathie's Reflections

As Christians, seasons of waiting are not new to us. We wait during Lent for the coming of the resurrection of Jesus at Easter. Advent is also a season of waiting. In Advent we wait for the birth of Jesus, but more importantly, we wait and reach for a deeper and more intimate relationship with God. This is the time for each of us to recommit to keep the faith and to embrace the gifts of hope, peace, joy, and love that we experience and celebrate in this Advent season.

Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, as well as the celebration of God's incarnation seen at the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matt 2:1), and his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29). During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer,

and fasting to prepare for this celebration.

Originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas but by the sixth century, however, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. But the "coming" they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the manger in Bethlehem, but his second coming in the clouds as the judge of the world.

As we approach the end of yet another tumultuous year, Christians seek to turn from the violence, oppression, greed, and hate we see day after day and enter this season focused on the meaning of the awesome gift found among the animals in a stable.

In the time of Jesus' birth, the same negative powers that we experience today filled the world. In those terrible times, Jesus' family, the Magi, and the Shepherds all took hope in God's vision that a world of joy and peace was possible. They took hope and invested in that vision, one as fragile as an infant exposed and vulnerable under the stars.

Advent is intended to be a season of fasting and prayer. Much like Lent, this time can

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cause us to reflect on the destruction of the many gifts that God has given to us. We think about the violence and evil in the world and it drives us to cry out to God to make things right, to cast out death's dark shadows. This exile from God's plan for humanity makes us look forward to the future and the grace we need as we pray for the Holy Spirit to renew the work of conforming us into the image of Christ.

When chaos descends upon us, our instinct is to hide within ourselves. We want to escape it, and we want to lean back into what is familiar. We want to cling to what we know because what we know is comfortable. The trouble is, in our longing for normalcy, we let go of the welcoming hand of grace. In our struggle to hang onto what we used to have, we let joy slip through our fingertips, but in trying to move forward in the chaos, we can grab God's hand because, as he promised, he will never leave us.

Finding joy amid chaos means being honest about what we are facing, and sometimes that takes time. We do not adapt in chaotic times by leaning away from what's in front of us, but by moving with the current of our everchanging reality. Finding joy in these challenging times means leaning into grace, for ourselves and for others.

To embrace God's grace is to focus our spirit on God's vision of true joy and peace. Let us embrace that vision for ourselves, share that vision with others and work to make it a reality even when the odds seem slim. Hope is not a prediction that things will turn out all right. The grace of God helps us to open the door, even when we feel that we do not have a drop of energy left and walk towards God's vision of a world free from oppression and exploitation. Hope is the creation of space for

something new to unfold.

How do we cultivate hope in ourselves and others? We begin by keeping our eyes and hearts open to witness the miracles in our midst. They may seem small given the challenges we face, but they are life giving. It is so easy to focus on what's broken and unrealized, but take time to celebrate victories, large and small and share them with others, send thank you notes, make phone calls, and give someone a hug. Give thanks for these opportunities in prayer knowing God is moving among us, not necessarily in a time that we understand but always honoring the promises he made.

Next, spend time imagining the kind of nation and world for which we are striving. The prophet Habakkuk told us in chapter 2:2-3 (The Message)

And then God answered: "Write this. Write what you see. Write it out in big block letters so that it can be read on the run. This vision-message is a witness pointing to what's coming. It aches for the coming—it can hardly wait! And it doesn't lie. If it seems slow in coming, wait. It's on its way. It will come right on time."

Hope is contagious. Hope is the force of energy that moves us forward and keeps us from sliding into the abyss of pain. Hope comes in both big and small experiences. The smallest, yet most powerful the world has ever seen was found in the manger. The hope that was born that night changed the world forever!

QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS

Highlights from the Vestry Meetings June and September 2023 (Note October's Vestry Minutes haven't yet been approved so not included in this edition)

Treasurer:

Dave Ackerman has reported that our Annual Audit that was prepared by Jack Konzelmann, Ann Woods, Rev. Cathie and himself was sent to the Diocese after the Vestry approved the findings. Our September Treasurer report showed that operating expenses were 65% below budget of operating loss. We have had to withdraw \$70,000 from investments to date for cash flow; \$15,000 of which was for the memorial garden. (Last year this time we had to withdraw \$60,000). Regular contributions are above budget.

Building and Grounds:

Kathy Gabrielle had presented the Vestry with the following:

- Two proposals were presented to the Vestry for necessary pruning of trees on the church and rectory property. The Vestry approved Mahwah Tree Service.
- Our AA group has approached us in allowing service dogs to attend their meetings. After discussion at the September meeting, the Vestry decided that they did not want to prohibit a person's comfort in attending a meeting, so service animals will be allowed; with a set of guidelines given to AA.
- Judy Malhotra has had further discussion with an iron work vendor for the fabrication of (2) rails up to the altar in the sanctuary vs. installing wooden railings. The quote for the wooden handrails by Smart Home Updates is \$2,135.
- Kathy has forewarned the Vestry of the possible upcoming expenses for 2024 additional tree pruning (particularly at the Rectory), sidewalk repair on the Sycamore Ave side of the church, and exterior painting of the entire church (with plaster work).

Outreach:

Judy Malhotra reported that Saturday morning classes at Oasis have resumed; volunteers are welcome to accompany her and Joan Lupardo. Our once-a-month food donation Saturdays are going well. In September the food drive teamed up with some HHK 8th graders which was very successful. An article of this event was featured on the Oasis website. Our school supply drive for the Ramapo Indian tribe was well received, and they look forward to us joining them once again at their Christmas party to receive our donations of children's gifts. The next Diaper Drive is October 7th. Judy was able to secure a furniture donation for our Rectory to make it easier to meet and have events in the home. A collection of food and toys for St. Hubert's Animal Shelter is being considered for St. Francis Day.

Memorial Garden:

The re-planting of the side Memorial Garden has been completed. Peggy Kievit is looking into the charges that have and will continue to incur for our sprinkler system in the Garden from Horizon since we have no contract for these services.

Rev. Cathie:

New Office Staff: The church has hired Sharon Scarpelli as our in-house accountant.

The Food Pantry: (Open 2nd Saturday of the month) continues to grow for those who come.

The Rectory: Right now this is being considered a "functional Mission Center" until the Vestry decides it is time to rent the home.

Adult Study: Wednesday and Thursday nights are going strong.

Blessing of the Animals: October 8th.

2023 Stewardship Theme: "Rooted in God's Word, Rooted and Grounded in God's Love."



QUARTERLY VESTRY FOCUS (continued)

New Business:

Arts at St. Bart's: The next scheduled event approved by the Vestry will be a performance by Jenna Esposito on Sunday, October 15th at 4pm. The church made a profit of \$260 from the Chamber Music event in June.

Sunday Church Music: Discussion on the process of determining the music and songs was held. It was decided that the Prelude and Postlude will be chosen by Soon and the others by Rev. Cathie. It was asked that our Sunday music be more contemporary, uplifting and a wider variety of music presented on Sundays.

Old Business:

Senior Recognitions: Ghada Harb has organized a listing of names to be recognized of past members of our church that used their Stewardship to guide us to where we are now. During a Sunday Service in September, the first names honored were Helen and George Clark. Other names have been assigned dates through the end of this year, continuing into 2024.

Technology Ministry: Instead of investing in a desk that would only secure some of the AV items, the team is considering it might be better to have a room constructed at the back of the Sanctuary to store everything inplace. Further discussion and quotes are being obtained.

Marketing: Wayne Kamidoi is working on a write up for the upcoming Jenna Esposito event for the newspapers. We were on the Borough of Ho-Ho-Kus website for the Blessing of the Animals and the Jenna Esposito events.

Many church members that we love and see no more planted seeds leaving lasting memories. Each month we will honor one or more of these. A church member will research our records and interview our parishioners, then make a presentation at a Sunday service. These presentations will be shared with our members via the B-Line. Here are the first two.

Honoring Dorothy Becica

Dorothy Dockray was born in Waldwick in 1916 and grew up in Ridgewood. Coming from a good Episcopalian family, she worshiped at Christ Church and later taught Sunday School there. She attended Ridgewood schools, and after graduating from Paterson State Teacher's College in 1939 she taught in the Waldwick school system. After her marriage she moved to Ho-Ho-Kus where she lived for the next 60 years.

During her time in Ho-Ho-Kus, Dorothy was a substitute and teacher's aide in the Ho-Ho-Kus Public School and a librarian at the Ho-Ho-Kus library. She was a Trustee of the library for fourteen years including six of them as President. When she joined St. Bartholomew's, and her teaching experience became known, she was immediately recruited to

teach Sunday School. Later she became one of the first women to serve on the Vestry.

But Dorothy's greatest contributions to St. Bart's came when our Rector, Charles Judson Child, invited her to join the Altar Guild. This became her major service to the Lord for the next 50 years. She used her sewing skills to make many of our communion linens. Dorothy was Directress of the Altar Guild for many years.

In the 1960s Bishop Leland Stark invited her to head the Diocesan Altar Guild. Dorothy declined this honor as Newark was not a safe place in those days.

Wendy Dockray, a former Warden at St. Bart's whose father and Dorothy were first cousins, shared this:

"Dorothy's work with the Altar Guild, including sewing and embroidering cloths, along with her time as Clerk stand out to me as important contributions to the church. She was truly a gracious and devoted member of St. Bart's."

Mike O'Neill, a massage therapist who cared for Dorothy a few years ago, recalls her as "a very nice lady."

And Ghada Harb, now Director of our Altar Guild, shares this:

"You cannot be in Altar Guild and not hear about Dorothy Becica. When I first started with Altar Guild, one of the most precise instructions I received was how to care for the altar linens. I was given a typed manual by Dorothy Becica for laundering, ironing and folding the altar linens. This manual is still used to this day to instruct new and existing members. If you have ever handled one of the St. Bartholomew's altar linens that has been embroidered ever so precisely, know that Dorothy's hands were at play. Yes we still have a few of those. Her memory is eternal!"

In 2005 Dorothy and her son John moved to Palmer Township, Pennsylvania, near Easton, where she lived until her passing in 2014. She is buried in the family plot in Valleau Cemetery.

So now you know about Dorothy Becica, a lesser-known member who made significant and lasting contributions to the life of St. Bartholomew's Church.

Honoring George and Helen Clark

As you heard from Pastor Cathie, we are honoring the seeds that George and Helen Clark had sown in our Parish, and we continue to this day to see bloom and flourish in our midst.

I truly enjoyed talking with several of you as you joyfully and reverently spoke and emailed me about your memories of George and Helen and their contributions, and it gave me great insight on the wonderful parishioners that they were in our church. I am honored to share my learnings.

Helen and George Clark moved to the area in the early 1950s to Waldwick and joined our church and made numerous contributions to our Church Family. George was a vestry member several times and since his profession was commercial architecture, he was happy to support our church in many of the projects that you see and enjoy today.

He oversaw the expansion and renovation of our school rooms; the Chancel and sanctuary were also added under his guidance which gave the church a cruciform shape. The beautiful ceiling that you see here was exposed and the trusses were added to support the roof. Just look how beautiful it is.

George also designed the altar and altar rail for the sanctuary as well as the pascal candle and baptismal font that we still use today. Windows were replaced in accordance with his design and the etchings were done by one of George's skilled contacts from his architectural network and as you know they are totally unique and definitely works of art. Do you look up to the top of our roof as you enter our church? If you do you will see the beautiful cross that George also designed. Our free-standing altar table was designed by George and materials were used when the altar was lowered and resized. The walnut frames, wainscoting for the walls and tabernacle, a focal point for our congregation. And we kneel for our communion at the railing that was also designed by George.

I do recall the blessing of the beautifully designed sanctuary lamp and the honoring of George's design and how humble he was during that recognition. He always made sure that everyone felt he was just one of us with his lighthearted humor and welcoming approach to all young and old alike, as well as new or well-established members of the congregation. We also credit George's gift of architectural design of our memorial garden on the south side along with the Celtic cross in the center that was from Vermont. The wood panel and plaques of those interred in our garden was also his design.

Wow! How much surrounds us today that sprung its beauty and efficient function from the seeds George planted with his God given gift of architectural design and love for our church. All of this couldn't have happened without Helen Clark's quiet demeanor and support for her husband's work in our Parish and testament to her love of her church. As Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "A man's wife has more power over him than the state has." She was a member and dedicated supporter of the women's group in our church. Did you know that she also served as a director to the YMCA in Ridgewood.

Kathy Gabrielle shared from her mother-in-law Evelyn that Helen was a leader and has led and supported many fundraisers and activities in our church. She chaired the annual antique show, organized Advent woman's teatime, co-chaired craft fairs, assisted in the collection of items for annual Action Auction. She also shared her influence and wonderful writing skills to keep our church happenings in the Ridgewood News as a liaison.

Both Helen and George were very hospitable and opened their home to many parishioners as I have learned. They continued to plant seeds of love and encouragement of parishioners of all ages. Toby Winiarski shared how he was honored to be invited to dine with the Clarks and remembers thinking that he was one of the youngest invited. Many of you shared stories of their hospitality. This reminded me of a saying by Homer: "There is nothing nobler or more admirable than two people who see eye to eye, keep house as a man and woman, confronting their enemies and delighting their friends."

Here are some more of George's accomplishments. Did you know he served as Commissioner and also Mayor of Ridgewood in the 1960s? As Commissioner he was in charge of public works and

during his tenure as mayor, he lobbied to ensure the continuation of commuter rail service to Bergen County when Erie Lackawanna Railway had threatened to shut it down. (Can you imagine how much different Bergen County would've been if that train actually shut down?)

Also, at the time he served as mayor the Civil Rights movement was at a critical time in our country. George worked hard to keep communication open amongst black and white communities in Ridgewood to establish racial reconciliation and harmony. The conviction of his faith was a significant factor in his actions as our previous Pastor Dan and Janet Kreller shared.

Did you know that if it weren't for George, Michael Gnerre would not be in the Choir? As he shared one year when he agreed to sing just for Christmas, George cleared the seat next to him for rehearsal so Michael could sit as he coached him on the nuances of singing bass. After the rehearsal he put his arm around Michael and said "Let's go find you a robe." Michael stated, but I do not need a robe since I am only singing for Christmas. George replied: "Oh come on, you might as well sing this Sunday. It'll be fine, I will help you." And the rest is history as Michael shared that he is forever grateful to George for taking him under his wing.

Virginia Smith remembers the wonderful neighbors in Helen and George when they lived in Waldwick and the kids played together. In fact, through my conversation with Virginia I learned that Merry Smith would be able to connect me with their son Russell whom we are pleased to have in attendance today with his Fiancée Beth McInnis as well as his daughter Hayley.

George also reminded Dave Ackerman often of his admiration of his father as a Ho-Ho-Kus Councilman. And Dave shared George's admiration of Isaiah as he advised him with this: "Be sure you assign someone with a strong voice to read Isaiah. Isaiah needs a strong voice!!!" In fact he also complimented Toby on the way he read the lesson. Toby shared he was glad that someone paid attention to what he was reading. As for the ushers, he always accepted a helping hand on the way down from taking communion and was resilient to stay independent on the way up.

It is such a pleasure to have talked with so many of you about George and Helen and what an honor to know them through you and see the impact of the seeds they have planted. Both have tirelessly worked to make our church life so beautiful and loving during their time and many more years as their legacy lives on. They epitomized the saying by Robert Louis Stevenson "Don't judge each day by the harvest you reap, but by the seed that you plant."

I am sure that there are many other contributions and stories, too many to name, just keep them coming as they are the fiber that knits our tapestry together.

I will leave you with this as a remembrance of George and Helen Clark from May Sarton:

"I would like to believe when I die that I have given myself away like a tree that sows seed every spring and never counts the loss, because it is not loss, it is adding to the future life. It is the tree's way of being. Strongly rooted perhaps but spilling out its treasure on the wind."

Thanks be to God for the seeds that George and Helen planted in the life of St. Bartholomew's.

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ST. BARTHOLOMEW'S CHURCH COMMUNITY GARDEN

Did you know that olive trees take 15 years to mature, and their roots can reach up to 23 ft below the ground? An olive tree life span is 500 years, the oldest of which is 1500 years old. So, what is the

relevance here?


